Weavers West Guild Education Committee News

All Classes, Workshops and Bee in the Know sessions are on hold until it is determined safe that they be held in the Weavers West Guild Studios, due to the continuing rise in the COVID numbers.

Don't forget to submit "Virtual Bee in the Know" on-line classes, workshops, etc. to Carol Byrne for distribution to the membership.

Pam Chumbley recommended that a virtual class, "Weaving on a Table Loom" by Kelly Casanova be considered as a possible alternative to Weaving II. A new member, Cynthia Geyer-Goering, who has done most of her weaving education through virtual classes, volunteered to compare the virtual class to the syllabus for Weaving II. The results of her research show that the two are closely related in content. We decided to proceed with a pilot study and have 2 volunteers, Cynthia and Mary Wilder who are taking the Kelly Casanova class together in the studio. So far, they are both pleased with their progress.

Simultaneously, Angela Buxton has volunteered to revamp the Weaving II curriculum for the in person class.

Depending on the results of the trial we are optimistic that when it is safe to do so, both virtual and in person classes will be available to members for learning to weave on a table loom.

How do you learn to weave on a rigid heddle loom in the time of COVID? Submitted by Pam Chumbley

Weavers West education team has come up with a new plan to offer Weaving I with less contact and more social distancing.

The NEW Weaving I: Rigid Heddle Virtual learning

This introductory weaving workshop will get you started weaving on a rigid heddle loom in about 2 hours. We use a quick method to warp and will guide you through weaving a sampler that teaches a variety of weaves.

In the first of two in-person sessions, you will learn to warp the loom and begin weaving.

Online videos produced by one of our own members will lead you through the process of making a sampler that teaches you more techniques beyond basic plain weave. The class will give you access to unlimited virtual sessions that will direct you through all the steps to complete a sampler wall



hanging including the finishing techniques. The class will also give you access to other instructors through Craftsy, if you want to experience other learning styles and more in depth instruction.

In the second in-person session, you will have the opportunity to ask questions that may come up while you watch the videos and trouble shoot problems.

(WIFI access required for virtual portion of the class)

Skills Developed:

- Loom terminology
- Direct warping
- Weaving terminology
- Finishing techniques
- Resources for patterns

Supplies Needed:

- Tape measure
- Scissors
- Paper and pencil/pen
 - Weft & warp yarn of your choosing (see fiber requirements in

binder)

• Loom Rental Package OR access to rigid heddle loom with accessories

FEE: \$50 Includes:

- Loom Rental Package*
- Use of a heddle, sley hook, warping peg, warp
- Access to online learning sites
- One on one in person instruction

*Loom Rental Package:

Use of a Weavers West rigid heddle loom, warping peg, sley hook, 7.5/8/0 reed for 3 weeks. \$100 security deposit required. If you already own or have access to a rigid heddle loom to use for the class and the equipment needed, class fee is \$30

CLASS SIZE: 2 students with 1 instructor. Masks required!

For those of you who were in the Weavers West Studio from mid-December until mid-January, you probably saw my chenille striped mock ruana in progress on loom 6. It was woven with rayon chenille 1450 yds/lb in a variety of aqua blue and bronze shades with bright accent stripes. The construction is tabby weave. The loom width was 21.5" using a 10 dent reed with 210 ends. There are 2 panels, each 84" in length woven from a 7 yard warp. I used a double bobbin shuttle throughout so there are 2 picks in every shed. For the variation in value from side to side, for the first panel, I used a light color and for the second panel a combination of darker shades. When the two panels are sewn together, there is an hombre effect created in the garment.

To construct the ruana, sew the 2 panels together with an overlap seam that is 42" in length. This creates a wide back panel and 2 narrow front panels. Hem all panels with a 1" hem.

The attached photos show that the ruana can be worn with the 2 front panels hanging straight down, or with one panel thrown over the opposite shoulder to create a cowl collar effect or with a belt to give a more shaped effect. For this cooler winter weather it makes a cozy garment that can be worn over anything.



This is a really easy project that can be done on any loom that has a 22" minimum weaving width. Any variation of yarns and end counts can be used to create two 84" finished panels, so it is a good way to use stash.
